
To Whom It May Concern,

Attached you will find the information that you requested in regards to the new Vendor Registration information as far as we could complete. I tried to contact Anne Rolle and the Finance department today but was told Ms. Rolle is not in, that there wasn't anyone in finance at the time to help me complete this for you and that Stuart McKibbin our contact there was not available either.

I have noted in an e-mail to Ms. Rolle that the vendor site did not allow me to print out the completed Vendor registration when it was completed and so I had to go back, log in and print Vendor Information from your site. But as you can see (or not) it is so small it is almost unreadable. This is the only option and the website does not allow me to print anything larger. Also, in order to complete it, it asked for a commodity code, none of which apply to us. So I simply put one in since I could not reach anyone at Flood Control to give us guidance. The blank letterhead and the W-9 are complete. We have included the 147C Letter from the IRS however it is under the heading of the old Elsinore-Murrieta Anza name. As you know, the Board of Supervisors made the change to Temecula-Elsinore-Anza-Murrieta in January of 2016 and the name change does not change the EIN. It is the same. We have forwarded information to the IRS to make the appropriate changes but they are saying it may take from 6-8 weeks to get the paperwork corrected. As you can see, they have us as a "recourse" not "Resource" District so it has to be changed anyway and the address that all payments should be paid to should be the current P.O. Box number at the bottom of this letterhead.



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



CARCD Forestry Committees

At the annual CARCD conference the CARCD Forestry Committee held open hours to solicit feedback on their draft action plan. The plan, developed from their statewide RCD needs assessment survey, outlines ways the committee can support RCD forest health initiatives and put their collective expertise to use for the benefit of all RCDs. The committee convened its quarterly meeting in advance of the annual conference to discuss new legislation, successful partnerships in the past year, and CARCD forestry-related grants.

#GivingTuesday and the End of Year Giving Campaign

On November 27, #GivingTuesday, CARCD and the RCD network kicked-off its inaugural community support campaign. CARCD participated in several meetings with California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) to discuss the implementation of technical assistance programs, the healthy soils program, SWEEP, as well as the upcoming legislative cycle.

NRCS and American Forest Foundation

CARCD held meetings with NRCS and American Forest Foundation to implement the RCPP forestry program. Currently the work is focused around combining funding sources, tools, and resources to create a comprehensive program in the Sierras and Northern part of the state, with the intention to build tools that can be used statewide.

California Natural and Working Lands Climate Change Implementation Plan Public Workshop

CARCD represented the interests of RCDs at a public workshop to discuss and solicit input on the development of the Natural and Working Lands Implementation Plan and associated 2030 intervention-based goal for carbon sequestration. The workshop was jointly hosted by the California Natural Resources Agency, CDFA, California Environmental Protection Agency, California Air Resources Board, and Strategic Growth Council.

Soil Health Summit

CARCD co-hosted the [annual Soil Health Summit](#) with USDA NRCS, which took place on November 14, concurrently with the first day of the CARCD conference. Attendees enjoyed a free day of technical trainings, education and outreach techniques, small group project discussions, and networking with soil health professionals. They heard from partners from East Stanislaus RCD, the Soil Carbon Coalition, the National Center for Appropriate Technology/ATTRA, Carbon Cycle Institute, Point Blue, and the keynote speaker Edward Quevedo from the Foresight Lab who spoke on regenerative economics. Following the summit, RCD affiliates and CCI had an in-person meeting on the progress of the Carbon Farm Network Working Group.

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Dear Fellow Leaders,

As many of you know, the National Conservation Foundation (NCF) alongside the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) launched the [Next Generation Leadership Campaign](#) in October. After returning home from the U.S. Air Force after Vietnam, I had the opportunity to purchase the ranch I was born and raised on. My father was a firm believer in the conservation mission, which inspired me to get involved with my local conservation district board and state association. Through state gatherings and annual meetings, I was connected with other like-minded people to share success stories and best practices. Unfortunately, NACD is becoming an older generation, and the further away we get from those who remember the devastation of the Dust Bowl years, the less it resonates with them. That's why cultivating new leaders is truly imperative—we cannot delay.

In order for the conservation legacy to live on, we need more young people to get involved in agriculture and conservation advocacy at the state, local and even federal level. That interest comes from exposure and access, which is why we have


a responsibility to create opportunities for new leaders to gain that access—whether it be providing testimony, meeting with public officials or hosting briefings. Often times, older farmers are more available to take time away from their farms—unlike our younger folks. It's understandable. The younger group has less outside help, are raising families and paying for equipment to keep their operations running.

We're going to continue to have older people in our leadership roles if we don't invest in the next generation. I challenge my fellow friends and colleagues to think about what investing in our next generation truly means. It requires us to think critically and figure out a way to help these young people get involved without breaking their banks. Getting folks involved in conservation starts through groups like FFA and 4-H, which are huge assets to our organization. But we have to take that one step further and keep them involved after college. We can't afford to lose our best leaders to other careers and organizations.

Tomorrow's sustainability starts today, but time is running out. Invest in a better, more innovative future by supporting this program. GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

After the Senate passed the 2018 Farm Bill last Tuesday, the House quickly followed suit on Wednesday and passed the final agreement with a 386-47 vote. NACD is pleased the 2018 Farm Bill passed by such a large margin – showing great support for the conservation policies included the agreement. President Donald Trump is expected to sign the legislation into law later this week.

Last Tuesday, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released a new proposed rule clarifying a "water of the United States" (WOTUS) definition to replace the 2015 rule. NACD had concerns with the 2015 rule due to its expansion of federal jurisdiction at the expense of more state or local control over natural resource protection. NACD is encouraged the EPA started this new process with the goals of limiting federal jurisdiction and providing clarity for landowners. NACD looks forward to the opportunity to publicly comment on the rule to make further improvements. Read NACD's statement on the proposed rule [in NACD's Newsroom](#).

NACD also continues to closely monitor the status federal funding for departments such as U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)

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



OREGON DISTRICTS UTILIZES TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FUNDS FOR ADMIN SUPPORT

While many conservation districts are using NACD technical assistance (TA) grant funding to grow capacity in the field, Oregon's **Umatilla County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD)** is utilizing TA funding to help behind the scenes.

In April, **Tiffany Schademan** was hired as a full-time administrative assistant to support the SWCD and U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources

NOTIFICATION TO POTENTIALLY AFFECTED GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES REGARDING APPLICATION OF AQUATIC PESTICIDES BY THE RIVERSIDE COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT (DISTRICT)

PURPOSE

As required by Provision VIII.B of the Statewide General National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit for the Residual Aquatic Pesticides Discharges to Waters of the United States from Algae and Aquatic Weed Control Applications, General Permit No. CAG990005 (General Permit), the District hereby provides notice of its intent to apply aquatic pesticide within its stormwater drainage facilities as part of its normal operations and maintenance activities. The District utilizes aquatic pesticides as a feasible method to maintain the design capacity of its drainage facilities and to minimize flood hazards.

TIME PERIOD

Applications will occur throughout the year.

LOCATION

Applications will occur within the District's drainage facilities and rights of way.

PRODUCTS

The District may use the following herbicides:

RESTRICTIONS OR PRECAUTIONS

All aquatic weed control pesticides will be applied only when necessary and by trained District personnel according to product label instructions and consistent with all local, state, and federal regulations. No special precautions need to be taken by your representative agencies as the District performs these ongoing activities.
